From the Director:

Greetings in the name of Christ! I hope you are having a terrific summer and are keeping safe from the heat. It has been a productive summer for CJAMM. Thanks to hundreds of hours from our committed volunteers and staff, we were able to hold both New Day Camps despite the flooding that took place at Cross Point Camp. We held New Day One at Canyon Camp and held New Day Too at Cross Point and floated all of our supplies, campers, and adult leaders into camp. Both camps required a lot of adjustment on our part and the logistics were, shall we say, challenging. However, we revamped our scheduling and curriculum and as a result, over 120 children of incarcerated parents, the forgotten victims of crime, had a great camping experience. Special thanks to Ken Long at Cross Point and David Combs at Canyon Camp, for making it possible. I also want to recognize the special hard work of Tony Altizer, Rev. Steve Byrd, Carletta Denison, Traci Jacomo, Kaiti Powers, Debi Self, Rev. Gary and Lynn Wilburn, and countless others who put in even more time and effort than usual into making sure we were able to have camp. CJAMM's staff and volunteers were not about to let a mere flood get in the way of doing ministry!

How you can help

You may have noticed an insert in your New Gate. We are beginning a brand new fundraising campaign that involves the 2 best activities in the world—Doing good for the needy and climbing rocks! I am going to compete in a rock climbing competition in Horseshoe Canyon Arkansas on September 26, 2015 called "24 Hours of Horseshoe Hell," where I will try to climb as many different routes and climb as many vertical feet as I can in a 24-hour period. I am asking people to pledge an amount of their choosing for every foot that I climb to support CJAMM. Last year I climbed about 4,500 feet and I am hoping to climb a vertical mile this year. If you pledge a nickel per foot, it will be a gift of about \$260. If you pledge a penny per foot it will be a gift of about \$50. If you pledge a \$1 per foot, it will be a gift of about \$5,000. Every bit helps! Also, you can also watch my progress that day on Facebook! As of when I wrote this article, we are 16% of the way to reach

our goal of \$10,000 or roughly \$2.00 per foot. With God's help, we will make it!

Your 100% tax deductible donation will be put to good use providing a great camping experience to forgotten victims of crime, sustaining housing and addiction recovery programming for those who need to break the vicious cycles of chemical dependence, and offering hope to those whom Christ called "the least of these." Together, we can change lives! I pray God's blessings upon each and every one of you.




Exodus House Graduate Jim Cargill and current Exodus House Resident Jerry Harris pose in front of one of Jim's trucks.

for having us at her house for our annual pool party. All of our residents went and we had a BBQ and lots of fun in the sun, water fights and good food.

We had the chance to be a part of helping with Shiloh Camp this year with Kathy & Mark Sewell, Gene Calloway and New Covenant UMC. We helped serve dinner last year and wanted to help again this year. One day all of our residents helped make and serve the sandwiches and snacks for lunch and also helped serve dinner one evening. What a blessing to be included and



to teach our residents about giving back and being the hands and feet of God.

We have also had several work days here at the Exodus House and are still trying to get Tony's apartment finished. Nichols Hills UMC, New Covenant and Wesley UMC were here to help remove

some shrubs in front and clean and organize the garage and work on Apt # 7 & Apt # 8. We would like to thank Lew McGinnis, Trevor Smith, John Lingo and Kathy Sewell and all those who gave their time to help with these projects. We continue to ask for any men's groups or any crews that may be interested in helping with the remodel of Tony's apartment to please contact Tony at (405) 417-1189 to discuss that project. We must have it completed within the next 2-3 weeks so we can use his current apartment for incoming residents.

Our goals for this year are to paint our apartment building and stairs and to plant new flowerbeds. Our biggest project is to totally remodel our courtyard by tearing it out, repaving, stamping and staining it and putting a drain down the center to resolve the flooding issues we have. We are excited to say we have a bid for the tear out and completion of the project for \$9,650 and \$4,000 for that project has been donated to us by one of our apartment sponsors. We also received two new bike racks by another. It is our dream to have a beautiful and inviting courtyard for all those who visit or tour our facility and especially for those who live here.

We have celebrated 10 graduations this year and served 28 residents and are expecting 7 more within the next month. We are in need of towels and washcloths, and hygiene products for incoming residents and still need more microwaves, coffeepots, can openers, vacuums, TV convertor boxes and antennas, beds, dressers, furniture and household items.

OPERATION HOPE PRISON MINISTRY

God continues to bless Operation Hope Prison Ministry (OHPM) with diligent volunteers who continue to devote an immense amount of their time to help OHPM clients make the necessary life changes needed to lead successful lives. A new Bedtime Stories program is now being facilitated at John Dahl Correctional Center. Dads are recorded reading bedtime stories to their children, and those recordings, along with the book and messages of love, are mailed to the children from their incarcerated dads. This contact keeps the families connected and helps alleviate some of the problems the children encounter when a parent is incarcerated. Also, a new class called Uprooting Anger will be taught at JH Lilley C. C. and Jess Dunn C.C. This class teaches the inmates how to identify



the symptoms, deal with and overcome their anger issues. On July 16, 2015, Operation Hope volunteers and staff transported 20 children to Eddie Warriors C.C. to visit their moms. It was a wonderful event, and the children and mothers enjoyed spending time together.

Operation Hope's 14th Annual Fall Fundraiser is scheduled for October 9, 2015 and Operation Hope's Golf Fundraiser is scheduled for October 19, 2015. Through the fundraisers. OHPM is able to raise funds to continue to provide services though Operation Hope's Pre-Release, Post-Release and Children's Programs. These programs help break the cycle of generational incarceration, lower repeat offenses, and assist in reconnecting family ties.
